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TWO WEEKS IN CAMBODIA - NANCY'S STORY

About four years ago I was looking for a short term, overseas, volunteering trip. With a husband and pets, I really wasn't willing to commit to months away from home. But then a friend told me about a Cambodian project based in Perth and that was it: the Awareness Cambodia connection was made.

I know there are a lot of wonderful projects operating in Cambodia but I feel very lucky to have found a project that is so well run with such respect for the local people. Hopefully this year I will be making my fourth trip with Awareness Cambodia. It's a week of hard work and long days, followed by a week of fun, touring and enjoying Phnom Penh and Siem Reap.

Most recently I helped with Awareness Cambodia's medical stream, Operation Nightingale - a medical clinic prototype for rural regions. This project was started to bring health care to areas where villagers might never have had access to any medical care or advice. It runs weekly throughout the year, and the International team of medical volunteers comes once a year to work alongside Cambodian Health Professionals.

We run clinics in small towns and also in very remote areas, hours away, reached via flooded streams and muddy roads. One year we couldn't quite get to the village so we commandeered a wooden hut in a rice field and set up the pharmacy in another stick building across the road.

There was no problem with letting patients know, out of seemingly nowhere, hundreds of people walked down the road to see us and wait patiently for their chance to speak to someone about their problem.

I enjoy it so much. It feels like I am really using everything I have learned in my 39 year nursing career, respect for the patient, clinical skills, sign language, knowing when to consult the doctor, working at speed and allowance for a very different culture are necessary to make the consultation successful.

It might sound corny, but it is very humbling when patients bow and, with sign language, give their thanks for our service.

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GRADUATION HOUSE UPDATE

Graduation House - we are now building!

Our building site is now a hive of activity with construction now begun. After much time spent working through Cambodian Government red tape, the contract between the architect, builder and Awareness Cambodia was signed last November.

Construction on the foundations is now in full swing, with the exception of a number of public holidays including, King's mourning, Chinese New Year, King's Cremation ceremony, and a VIP party which saw our street closed down!

Without doubt, this is Awareness Cambodia's most ambitious building project. A considerable amount of planning and effort has been undertaken to finally reach this stage. Your donation is certainly getting 'bang for buck', whilst staying true to the desire for a quality build.

The completed project, estimated to cost US\$780,000, will cover land purchase, construction of three (three and four storey buildings) and the fit out. Through your generous donations we have raised a total of \$500,000, but a further \$280,000 is still needed to make a debt-free building a reality.

Construction is expected to be completed within 18 months, and we will look forward to keeping you updated throughout the year on the progress. I trust in 2014, when you receive your 'Graduation House - Opening Invitation", you'll be able to join us in Cambodia to open and dedicate the new complex.

The Graduation House project is changing young Cambodian's lives. We know they have already suffered so much and look forward to housing them in a safe and permanent residence to assist with ongoing education ambitions.

alphabet features 33 consonants and about 20 vowels, and using the standard QWERTY keyboard involves a lot of use of the ALT and CTRL keys.

A huge welcome to all or new team members!

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


CHUMRARN & THIDA'S WEDDING
