Many of you would know Kim and I go back and forward between Cambodia and Australia spending approximately six months in each country.

When we returned to Australia earlier this month, our son Justin had just flown back from Beijing, having completed his Master's degree in Chinese law, and was now about to start work at a well-respected law firm. It was one of those proud moments as parents remembering the years we'd invested, recognising and celebrating his achievements and now watching him start a professional career; one that would give him opportunity to make a significant contribution to the community, while earning a decent income, laying foundation for a successful future.

As I sat reflecting, the significance of where we have invested our lives dawned.

In the other place we call home - Cambodia, one of those little girls we took in back in 2000, Sokcharn (having lost her parents to AIDS) has become the first of our students to graduate from University as an accountant.

Like Justin, given opportunity and with our support, she is now setting out on her own professional journey; one that is helping her nation fill the education vacuum left behind by the Khmer Rouge era, and giving her a professional skill set that will help her step out of the poverty enveloping that nation. It's amazing!

Every day as I walk into our office, I pass a quote on the front window by the American Scholar and Teacher, Forest E. Witcraft. It says;

*A hundred years from now it will not matter what my bank account was, the sort of house I lived in, or the kind of car I drove... but the world may be different because I was important in the life of a child.*

Never has that statement been more meaningful and appropriate than seeing it at work in the changed lives of these 'children' around me today.

# New English program is growing

Awareness Cambodia has a number of active projects which benefit the Kompong Speu community in three main areas; health, education and childhood development.

Wherever possible we work alongside and support established community departments and services in the area. We believe this holistic approach will empower Cambodians to create sustainable inroads in making generations of poverty in rural Cambodian history.

In conjunction with this strategy, Awareness Cambodia is also continuing its English Second Language for Primary Schools program (ESLPS) – in partnership with The Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports – which now has four schools participating after our initial six-month pilot program.

Our newest schools to join are Kirivong Sleng Primary school with 10 classes of 425 students and Sen Teav Primary School with 303 students. These schools were chosen as they are located in the poorest province in Cambodia – Kompong Speu.

## Awareness Cambodia Story

*Awareness Cambodia is a not for profit, overseas aid organisation established in 1996 by Perth dentist, Dr Gary Hewett in response to the incredible suffering and poverty experienced by the Cambodian people after the execution of 25% of its most intelligent under Khmer Rouge leader Pol Pot. We work to relieve poverty and encourage development of life skills through participation in self sustaining projects.*

*Awareness Cambodia doesn't simply raise funds to pass onto other organisations; instead we initiated projects in response to ongoing needs. Together these projects form an environment that provides a seamless structure for orphaned Cambodian children to transition into well adjusted and self sufficient leaders, so necessary in rebuilding Cambodia's future.*

*We also see Cambodian culture as a unique national treasure meaning all efforts are taken to ensure our presence doesn't simply result in these children being westernised, relocated to other parts of the world or being reduced to the indignity of a dependency on overseas handouts.*

*Effective training for indigenous staff, a non adoption policy, working in cooperation with local organisations and government departments as well as the inclusion of self funded business components in projects are key components in reaching our objectives.*

# Our kids are graduating!

It's exciting to have eight House of Progress students graduating high school this month! It is remarkably Awareness Cambodia's fourth year group to graduate, with the students to move to Phnom Penh and commence university studies in September. To help the transition from House of Progress to Graduation House we ran our first Career Advice Seminar. The three-session seminar topics included:

- How to choose the right university and course
- How to write a CV and cover letter
- Preparing for a job interview
- Moving to Phnom Penh, and the expectations of Graduation House students.

This style of seminar is very rare in Cambodia, with nothing like it in Kampong Speu. We are hoping to branch out next year and run it for high school students in the local community aswell.

## AWARENESS CAMBODIA MEDICAL PROGRAM

The Operation Nightingale project continues to provide much needed services free of charge to some of the poorest people in Cambodia.

Working in close cooperation for over six years with the Provincial Health Department, Awareness Cambodia has established well-trained Cambodian doctors in four provincial health centres. Our doctors have not only helped stabilise many of the community's prevailing chronic conditions, but have been instrumental in training up nursing and auxiliary staff to provide increasing standards of service to their patients.

This progress is exceptional considering most Government rural health clinics do not have basics such as electricity or running water.

## MEDICAL SCHOLARSHIPS



Awareness Cambodia believes education plays a key role in helping to fight poverty. And as a result, the Operation Nightingale Project and our Graduation House Project are uniting with a number of Australian surgeons and medical professionals in 2013 to initiate a “Medical Scholarship Program”.

The scholarships will target poor and academically-gifted students from Cambodia’s rural community who do not have the financial means to move to Phnom Penh and study medicine. The scholarship will provide students the same support structure as Graduation House, including university fees and accommodation. They will also receive in-country mentoring through our well-trained Cambodian Health care professionals, with mentoring by Australian surgeons and doctors.

## AGRICULTURAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Currently about 65% of the Cambodian population is engaged in agriculture, but sadly productivity in the sector remains low with about 35% of the rural population living below the poverty line.

To improve this vital area, Awareness Cambodia is developing agricultural scholarships for rural students in partnership with the “Tim Purcell Cambodia Scholarship Fund” (TPCSF).

The Scholarship Fund (TPCSF) will continue the legacy of Dr Timothy Purcell in supporting poverty alleviation in Cambodia, by enabling students from underprivileged backgrounds to complete agriculture-related studies. The scholarships aim to develop student capacity to effectively contribute to programs that enhance agricultural productivity and rural development.

In June our Cambodian staff travelled to three remote primary schools in the province of Kompong Speu and delivered 1,110 backpacks filled with school supplies.

The journey to the local government schools of Kirivong Sleng Primary School, Sen Teav Primary School and Kamnob Primary School comes as part of our Case 4 Change program – which delivers vital educational support to the poorest regions of Cambodia.

These primary schools were chosen to receive the backpacks having taken part in our English Second Language for Primary Schools pilot program (ESLPS), as part of a multi-layering strategy.
